
QUICK REVIEW

DIGGING DEEPER



1 Corinthians 15:24-28, ESV – 24 Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. 25 For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. 26 The last enemy to be destroyed is death. 27 For "God has put all things in subjection under his feet." But when it says, "all things are put in subjection," it is plain that he is excepted who put all things in subjection under him. 28 When all things are subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to him who put all things in subjection under him, that God may be all in all.

The passages in 1 Corithians tell us that there is one God, who is the Father, and is the source of all things. How was this counter-cultural in the city of Corinth? How is this counter-cultural today?

The LORD is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. 29 He gives power to the faint, and to him who has no might he increases strength. 30 Even youths shall faint and be weary, and young men shall fall exhausted; 31 but they who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint. Romans 1:25, ESV - 25 because they exchanged the truth about God for a lie and worshiped and served the creature rather than the Creator, who is blessed forever! Amen. Looking at the passages above, what is significant about God as the Creator? What is the "lie" that people have exchanged with the truth of God the Creator? What does it look like for you to "wait for the Lord" (Is 40:31)? In what circumstances is it difficult for you to wait for the Lord? Why? **TAKING IT HOME**

What task does the Father give the Son? Why does Paul make such a clear distiction between

Nicene Creed
